

DISCOVER THE ALAMO AT THE DOAI NATIONAL RALLY 2006 by Jay Keneson

ur national rally this year will be held at the Blazing Star RV Resort in San Antonio, Texas, a true luxury RV resort. Located west of the city just off Hwy 1604 near Sea World, Blazing Star provides full hook-ups, concrete sites, paved roads, and trees. (See Woodalls or Trailer Life directories for additional information.)

Dates for the rally start with early arrival on October 1 and departure on October 8. The rally-before-the-rally will be on October 2-3. This will allow for golf in Bandera, the "Cowboy Capital of the

World" (see *FMCA Magazine*, Oct, 2005, p.106). Additionally, the early dates allow for tours of San Antonio. Points of interest include:

- Market Square (El Mercado) offers exciting shopping in an Old Mexico-type setting with great Mexican restaurants.
- The Alamo (Mission San Antonio de Valero), the most famous spot in Texas, and four other old missions that are still active churches (and which form a National Historical Park), were built during settlement by Spain in the 18th century.
- San Fernando Cathedral, still active, is the oldest cathedral in the U.S., constructed 1738-1755.
- The Spanish Governor's Palace, once the home to the Spanish viceroy and governor of northern Mexico and Texas.
- The River Walk (Paseo Del Rio) with its many restaurants, shops, hotels, and subtropical plants, allows a refreshing escape from the street level traffic as one strolls the pathways or views the scene from a narrated river barge tour (see FMCA Magazine, Oct. 2005, pp. 102-107). This is the pride of the city, and a must-visit place.

Ex-military folks may wish to visit Fort Sam Houston,

Lackland and Kelly Air Force bases, Randolph Air Force Base, Old Brooks Field, or Stinson Field. Others may also wish to visit Fiesta Texas and Sea World (both on winter schedule), as well as the San Antonio zoo, botanical gardens, La Villita, and

the nearby Texas hill country.

You may ask, why are we starting the rally early? Many like to come early, get settled and have time to explore on their own. By having the tours up front, they don't interfere with the rest of the rally and will allow you to plan the places you still wish to visit. We plan to have many knowledgeable hosts available to assist you in deciding where to go and how to get there.

Now we are ready to continue with a more traditional rally, including seminars, vendors, maintenance and repairs. Don't forget great meals, entertainment, and visits with old Discovery friends, and the making of new ones. If you don't come for the full week, you will probably wish you had taken advantage of this great vacation destination!

Do you play a musical instrument? Please bring it! We plan to have a gathering area where you may join other musicians or just sit, listen or sing along.

Another first will be signs for the RVs of all national officers and chapter presidents for easy access should you have a question or a problem.

The weather this time of year is usually 60 and 70 at night, and 70 and 80 during the day. No guarantee on rain, however there was none during that period this year.

We sincerely hope to make this your best DOAI rally ever! However, you know who makes it great - YOU! The planning provides the structure only. As you know, your presence and the many activities you volunteer to help with or participate in are what make or break the rally. It's our rally, not theirs, so come and join in!

Plan on being in San Antonio October 1-8, 2006 to *Discover the Alamo.* Let's make this the best one yet!

Lazydays is a city of various motor homes, fifth wheels, C class, B class, travel trailers, and pop-ups. There are many RVs to see. Little known is Lazydays' parts store. It is located in the front line of the service bays. Should you contemplate RV service at Lazydays, make your appointment three months in advance of the rally date.

The three chapters preparing for the winter rally are working hard to have everything in order for your arrival. RallyPark and I remind you, the assigning of sites is very flexible. No one is assigned or guaranteed a specific site. There will be an attempt to park you with or near your friends.

DOAI has reserved a limited number of sites. To reserve the entire park and not occupy all the sites is price prohibited. Lazydays RallyPark rents out the remaining sites to other RV'ers. Rally attendees will be expected to wear their name tags at all times, a means for our sheriff to identify you as a paid welcomed person at dinner, entertainment, and seminars. As in previous years, it was necessary for DOAI to share RallyPark with lesser-sized group rallies.

Lupton is our caterer, and scheduled by popular demand is the shaved roast beef dinner. There is always enough for the hearty appetite for seconds. On the final night, a delicious meal of southern fried chicken to please the taste buds of the "finger

lickin." The three chapters grant permission to pick up the chicken with your fingers and *bon appetit*.

We have limited space for vendors. In our scheme of things, we plan some vendors to have booths in the big hall, and some at their sites. Support our vendors.

The entertainment that is under contract is the best: the New Odyssey show always receives a standing ovation. People enjoy their humor and music. The Bellaires, a newly formed local quartet, will entertain with their harmony and large library of old and new hit songs.

This website contains a number of interesting reviews of dealerships, service centers, and repair facilities across the country. As of the latest count, 782 reviews have been posted.

If you wish to check out a facility before you take your D in for service, visit this site. You can browse by

state, and some states have more reviews than others. You can also browse by vehicle type. It's entirely possible that

the facility you've chosen hasn't yet been reviewed. If you do use that facility, be sure to post your review as a service for others.

Of course, not all reviews are praises. There are a number of negative reviews, and these could help you avoid possible difficulties by checking it out in advance.

A DOAI couple had an unfortunate experience at a repair facility several months ago. They have been urged to post their information on the website, so that others will be forewarned.

It's easy to post your review: at the home page, simply click on "click here," and you'll be taken to the page where you can enter the information.



IMPORTANT EGROUP INFORMATION

Update Your E-Mail Addresses!

ne of the many benefits of belonging to DOAI is access to the eGroup. Many members find that this is an excellent way to learn about their Discovery motor home, and share a multitude of information ... everything from computers to parts to trip advice, and more.



However, eGroup membership requires two things: you must own a Discovery, and you must be a paid-up member of DOAI.

Periodically, the eGroup membership is checked against the DOAI member rolls to eliminate those who no longer belong to DOAI. **This is determined by e-mail address.** Some members use a different e-mail address for the eGroup than their regular e-mail address. The membership directory (accessible from the INFO, MEMBERS page on the DOAI website) was recently revised to contain a column for your eGroup e-mail address, if it is different from your regular e-mail address.

That means the total cost to get a newsletter to you ends up around \$2.33, and this cost will increase in 2006 because the postage rates are going up.



As I write this we have two members, Arlene Ritchie and Patty Headley, who are dealing with health issues. I ask that you remember them in your prayers as they recover.



FLEETWOOD TECHNICAL INFORMATION: UNDERSTANDING YOUR DISCOVERY WARRANTIES

The road, as they say, goes on forever, but unfortunately warranties do not. We may all think we know our warranty coverage limitations, but what we tend to lose track of is that the Discovery is not an automobile. While the warranties seem to operate in a similar manner, we would be better advised to use our *home* as a comparison rather than our car. A quick review of the facts now may save grief in the future.

Your Fleetwood 12-month/15,000 mile limited warranty covers the 12-volt DC and 120-volt AC wiring, the fresh water, drain water, and liquefied petroleum gas plumbing. Like any good home warranty, the Fleetwood warranty covers appliances, safety detectors, climate control systems, and ventilation ... all the items you would normally find in a home warranty. In addition to this, your warranty protects your leveling and room extension systems, floor coverings, and wall coverings

A common question is, "My coach had 1,500 miles on it when I bought it. If the Fleetwood warranty is good for 15,000 miles, then shouldn't my warranty run to 16,500 miles?" The traditional one year limited warranty is a 12-month/12,000 mile warranty, but motor homes, unlike automobiles, are driven to the dealership rather than riding out on a truck. Fleetwood's additional 3,000 miles of warranty is designed to cover such delivery mileage; therefore the closer to the factory you live, the more extra mileage your warranty will have.

Your best protection is to read the owner's manuals that come with the coach and familiarize yourself with the additional coverage provided by many of the component manufacturers. Most dealers will advise you of any remaining warranty when you bring the coach in for service. The Fleetwood representatives at the toll-free customer service number are happy to advise you of any remaining warranty; however, as Fleetwood does not administer these warranties, the representatives may not have the most current information on these vendors.

There are a number of items that are not covered under the Fleetwood warranty. These include:

- * Consumable items such light bulbs, fuses, wiper blades, lubricants, tires, and batteries.
- * Incidental and consequential damages such as transportation to and from a dealer or Fleetwood service center, loss of time or commercial income, inconvenience, loss of use, towing charges, bus fares, vehicle rental, phone calls, or
- * Fair wear and tear such as sun fading of fiberglass, fabrics and drapes or wear to the carpet. Also included in this is wear due to environmental conditions such as hail, road salts, or chemicals
- * Defects caused by or related to abuse, misuse, negligence, accident, alteration, or modification (to include any modification of the odometer).

- * Any damage caused by or related to failure to comply with instructions contained in the *Owner's Information Package*.
- Any losses, damages, or claims stemming from microbial action, including but not limited to mold, mildew, fungus, and dry rot.

If you are not sure of the warranty and need a repair on a vendor-supplied system, you may want to contact them directly to verify the warranty status on the product. The trick is locating the correct number. Here is a list of the most common Discovery vendors:

If your component manufacturer is not on this list, then a call to the Fleetwood toll-free customer service number should provide one if the manufacturer accepts calls from the public.

Owners of "pre-loved" Discoverys are protected by Fleetwood transferring the remaining base and structural

limited warranties to new owners. However, most of the supplier warranties are non-transferable; therefore, once the Fleetwood limited warranty has expired, you will have to rely on your extended service contract, if you have purchased one.

If you did not obtain an aftermarket warranty at the time you bought your coach, there are a number of companies

who will be happy to sell a warranty on an existing coach, once they have had it inspected. Simply typing "RV warranty" into most Internet browsers will provide you with a wide range of companies vying for your business. Before purchasing in this marketplace, you would be well advised to check with the Better Business Bureau or ask for feedback from other RV owners on Internet bulletin boards or forums.

A final note on your warranty coverage: you may find yourself at the end of warranty with outstanding issues that still require work. A quick perusal of the owner's manual can put a quick end to last minute panic. Chapter 1 states, "Written notice of defects must be given to the selling dealer or manufacturer not later then ten days after the expiration of the warranty period." Be certain that you advise Fleetwood of all outstanding issues, as this will extend the coverage for the specific items for a short period of time to allow you to schedule a service appointment at your Fleetwood dealer.

Don't sit on your problems and hope they will go away and don't compromise your warranty by attempting repairs yourself. There will be plenty of time to hone your skills as a shade tree mechanic. The warranty is there for you to use. If you are in doubt about your coverage, the Fleetwood Owner Relations Department is just a phone call away at 800-322-8216

RV EDUCATION 101

RV TRAVEL SECURITY CHECKLIST

For one minute, try to think the way a criminal would think. If you were at a rest stop looking for your next target or victim, what would you look for? Let's pretend for a moment that you were going to target a vehicle. Which would be more appealing, a car whose owner stopped for a quick bathroom break or an expensive looking Class A motor home, whose owners are out walking their dogs? I don't have the mind of a criminal, but this is an easy choice. That expensive looking

RV probably has expensive contents inside such as jewelry, cameras, and a laptop computer.

Okay, we have come to the conclusion that we, the RV'ers, are the prime target for the criminal mind, so what can we do to protect ourselves? That's what this RV security checklist is for – to give you some ideas on how to protect yourself and your personal belongings when you're traveling in your RV.

- *Don't stay overnight at a rest stop. Rest stops attract criminals. If you stop at a rest stop, it should only be for a short break and then back on the road. Lock the RV and take turns using the facilities, always leaving someone in or close to the RV. Always be on the lookout for anything or anyone that looks suspicious. Keep your cell phone handy in case you need it, and don't open the door for anybody, unless you know who it is.
- ** Rest stops aren't the only place you need to be concerned about. Every time you stop to refuel there are certain precautions you need to take. It's easy to be vulnerable to a thief at a gas station or a truck stop. I have a bad habit of leaving my wallet on the console of our Class C motor home. The door isn't locked and your spouse is taking advantage of the time to walk the dogs. This is how quickly it can happen. Get in the habit of locking the doors whenever you or someone else is not physically in the RV.
- * Most robberies occur at night and most travel-related robberies occur at rest stops, gas stations, convenience stores, and ATM machines. Try to schedule most of your stops during daylight hours, and whenever you stop be aware of your surroundings. If something doesn't look right, leave.
- * Wal-Mart or other parking lots where you might stop to get a few hours of sleep can present security problems, too. You should always park in a well-lit area and the entry door of the RV should be facing where most of the activity is. A thief prefers to work where it is dark and where it is least likely to draw any attention. Close your curtains or blinds so it's not possible for someone to look inside. Don't open the door for anybody unless you know who it is.
- * As much as we would like to believe that campgrounds are 100 percent safe and secure, don't let your guard down. You don't need to be paranoid, just use some common sense. Don't leave expensive equipment lying around

- unsecured. Vehicle tow bars, hitches, bicycles, and other items need to be under lock and key.
- * Keep any valuables inside the RV, secured and out of sight. It's a good idea to purchase a small fireproof safe to store valuables and important paperwork in. The safe might protect your valuables from the hazards of a fire, but it will still need to be stored in a secure, out-of-the-way place, inside the RV.
- * Always lock the RV when you're not physically at the campsite. Do not store valuable equipment in outside storage compartments. Believe it or not, a vast majority of RVs use the same exact key as yours for outside storage compartments. If you store valuables, like golf clubs, fishing gear, or tools in the outside compartments, you may want to have the locks changed.
- ** Before you leave on a trip, make sure your Emergency Roadside Service Plan is current. In the unfortunate event that you break down on the road, try to pull off in as safe a place as possible and call for help immediately. Stay with the RV until help arrives.
- * It's unfortunate that we live in a day and age where we need to take these added measures to protect ourselves. I don't want you to feel like everybody you meet during your travels is a thief or has bad intentions. Just use common sense and be aware of what is going on around you.

Plan your trip, travel safe and enjoy your RV experiences. Remember, getting there is half the fun. Happy camping! *

EGROUP CONVERSATION

Not every DOAI member participates in the eGroup. In an effort to share helpful information from the eGroup, occasionally we will publish a conversation which may be of assistance to non-group members. This time we feature a question by Mike Maness, and a helpful response by Rod Payne.

Should I Be Concerned?

ike Maness posted this question: "I have a 2000 37.5-foot D, which I've had for about 11 months. We've recently moved to Asheville, NC, and are planning to hit the road again for Florida next month.

"The concern I have is if the following events are expected when putting a heavy load on my 275 HP Cummins.

"I was towing my Honda CRV (3,500 lbs) on a U-Haul auto hauler (2,000 lbs) up to Johnson City, TN, to the nearest Blue Ox dealership, to get a towing system installed. I never realized how steep some of the climbs are, and my uphill speed was a wimpy 30 mph, obviously because of the maxed-out weight.

"It was the amount of smoke and diesel fumes that were pouring out of the exhaust that was new to me, since I've never towed anything as heavy, nor up as steep a climb, as this trip.

"The outside temperature was 30° F, and my wife, who was following in our other car, was fumigated.

"Is this typical, or is it possible to overtax these things and cause damage?

"I'm having the D serviced while it's getting fitted with the tow system. Is there anything that I should have them check related to this occurrence? I never had a

chance to drive the D after I dumped the load, because they waited for me until after their closing time ... it took longer to make the trip than expected.

"Any thoughts on the subject? I'm hoping that minus the 2,000 lbs of the trailer will make a difference. What are others' experiences towing over steep terrain?"

Rod Payne responded: "FWIW, I'm neither a 'techie' nor a guru; however, I have the stock 275 Cummins in our 1999 37V Discovery with about 60,000 currently on the odometer. We also have the Onan QD genset. We bought her new in Tampa, FL at Lazydays. We are full-timers and have always been since we bought the retirement lifestyle.

"Everything we own (or most of it at least) is in our coach. For the record, we have four MP75 solar panels on elevating and rotating mounts on the roof, ten batteries in the storage bay, an overhead lifting system for my handicapped wife, an electric Super Arm Lift to bring her and her wheel chair into and out of the coach, a Yamaha XT225 street legal motorcycle mounted to the rear of the engine on a steel platform.

"We usually travel with a full, or near full, fresh water tank and hopefully a full propane tank. Our toad is a full-size 1999 Ford E150 van. It has a steel Crow River VanGater II electric platform lift. In the van we have a 45-gallon water box that is often full of water as well, if we intend to camp somewhere out in the remote regions of the world and aren't sure of the availability or quality of water.

"Inside the van we also have a large trolling motor battery, a tool box, an 18 HP Johnson outboard motor, an electric trolling motor, portable boat gas tank, a three- and a six-gallon gas can, two five-pound propane bottles, fishing tackle box, water hoses, tables, three chairs, two end tables, and a foldable Black & Decker Workmate. On the rear of the van we have an 80-pound MotoTote motor cycle carrier with a 300-pound DRZ400S Suzuki street legal dirt bike mounted thereon. On the top of the van we have a 13'7" three-seater Gregor welded aluminum fishing boat with an Eide electric boat load/unloading device. I have had the rear springs of the Ford improved with two extra leaves.

"I've given you all of this information to let you know that we are probably as heavy as you can get. When we had the complete rig weighed at the A-Weigh-We-Go facility at a DOAI rally, we were told that we were legal if we only towed with our coach water tank half full. (They said that we were

overweight if we went out with the water tank full.)

"We have switched from the factory Michelins to Toyo Hyperadial S (the M124Z, 265/75R 225 14 ply rating) and we have had all of them 'siped' by Les Schwab Tire Center. The performance of the tires has been excellent. The purchase price was also an excellent buy for us at the FMCA rally in Pomona, CA.

"Now as to our coach's engine performance: as you

may know, we live on the west coast. If you want to go somewhere, I can assure you that there will be some significant mountains involved! Our travels have taken us coast to coast, throughout the eastern seaboard, all over Canada, the Yukon, Alaska, and Mexico's mainland and the Baja. Recently, when we crested the Tehachapi Summit

(elevation 4,064'), pulling the weight I have detailed above, the slowest speed that we ever got to was 35+; our average speed was 45+ over the summit. I don't recall any summit that brought us to a speed less than 35 mph.

Rod and Linda Payne's fully-loaded D

"We've never used a quart of oil between changes. Our average fuel consumption ranges from a low of 9.5 to a high of 13.0 We travel at legal speed via our cruise control, 55 mph in CA and 70 mph in AZ. We love our Cummins! We have a friend

who works on modifications for diesels. He is always after me to 'soup up' our Cummins; I won't let him touch it!"

WEATHERING THE STORMS ON THE ROAD

ach year, we spring ahead and fall back. Just as April showers bring May flowers, the changing of the seasons means different weather and, subsequently, different driving conditions. These varying driving conditions require adjustments to the normal operation of your motor coach. In

some cases, the modification can be as minor as slowing down, while at other times a more proactive approach is necessary. Knowing what adjustments work for each weather condition can give you an edge behind the wheel.

Wind and Air

Wind is perhaps the most common and least predictable of all weather-related driving conditions. Some vehicles are affected more by the wind than others. Because of the large side surface, motor coaches can get jostled around a good bit by wind. You may have noticed that when you approach an overpass, the air pressure seems to shift by 180 degrees. What once was the wind coming from the left, now seems like it is pushing from the right. To lessen this effect, anticipate the change in wind pressure when you're approaching an overpass. As you

draw near, start to release the pressure that you've applied against the wind with the steering wheel, which in turn will make the coach react in a less violent manner when you reach the spot where the pressure shifts.

Vehicles are also affected by the mass of air that is pushed in front of a tractor-trailer. As a tractor-trailer overtakes your motor coach, the air usually pushes the vehicle to the right at the beginning of the passing maneuver, and then pulls the vehicle back to the left as the tractor-trailer completes the pass. You can reduce this movement by placing your coach toward the right side of your lane. This maneuver is safest when you're traveling in the far right lane. If you're using another lane, moving to the far right of that lane might cause the driver in the lane beside you to panic because it looks like you're going into his lane.

Rain and Hydroplaning

Another common weather condition you'll experience on the road is rain. Rainy conditions are most dangerous during the first 15 minutes of rainfall. The roadway absorbs so much oil and petroleum that when water is added to the equation, a very slippery road surface is created. Reduce your driving speed and increase your following distance when the roadway is wet. This is necessary because it takes longer to stop your coach on a slippery surface. Make slow, smooth applications to the throttle and brakes, which will reduce the potential of getting involved in a slide. Your steering wheel adjustments should be calm and steady as well. For the best possible visibility, drive with your headlights on.

Rainwater can also be dangerous when it pools on the road surface. Most people would guess that because of the weight

of a motor coach, the tires would adhere to the road all the time. But that's simply not the case. Hydroplaning is a phenomenon that is caused by the tire surface leaving the roadway and climbing up on top of the water sitting on the road. This causes the tire to lose contact with the road and, for the most part, renders the steering wheel and the brakes useless. Hydroplaning usually occurs at speeds above 50 miles per hour, although it can happen at lower speeds if the

tires are not in good operating condition. Preventing hydroplaning is so critical that the federal government requires an additional 2/32" tread on the front tires of commercial vehicles over what is required on the rear tires.

You can reduce the possibility of hydroplaning by following a couple of easy procedures. First, slow down. Try to avoid the low spots on the highway where the water gathers, such as in grooves where tires have worn down the pavement. Move just slightly to the left or right of the groove onto the portion of the lane that is not covered by water. This increases your vehicle control, while decreasing the amount of water splashed onto other vehicles.

Driving in heavy rain presents another hazard – a condition known as "wet brakes." Wet brakes occur when the rainwater is splashed up onto and into

the brakes. It occurs more commonly on drum brakes than it does on disc brakes. To reverse the wet brakes effect, once you've reached an area where the roadway is not so wet, make a normal brake application. If the brakes do not work normally, place your left foot on the brake pedal just hard enough to feel that is it trying to slow the coach down. Continue with your right foot on the accelerator in the position that it was in before you started the procedure. Drive with very light pressure on the brake pedal for 10 to 15 seconds. Take both feet off the pedals and try another normal brake application. If the brakes still aren't working normally, repeat this procedure until they dry out.

Fog

Another condition you may encounter on the road is fog. You've probably seen reports on television where multivehicle accidents have occurred when fog causes a whiteout condition. In a whiteout, which can also be created by blowing snow, drivers simply can't see. With visibility at near zero, vehicles begin crashing into each other.

Recent investigations by the ABC television program 20/20 give us some insight into the problem. Michael Gilliland, ABC's science editor, was placed into a simulator that duplicated a dense fog condition and monitored the reactions of the driver. In each case they found that a driver entering the fog at 65 miles per hour would before long be traveling at 85 or 90 miles per hour. It appeared that once the drivers lost all reference points, they were too frightened and busy to look at the instruments and inadvertently increased their speeds dramatically. I believe that in addition to a loss of

reference points, the fear of being hit from behind also spurs drivers on blindly.

Observation can help you to avoid "pea soup" fog. When you see moisture lying near the ground in fields alongside the roadway, be aware that it doesn't take much for this fog to pool in an area in front of you. As a general rule, these conditions are most common in the early morning, early evening, or during hours of darkness. The moisture from the air can start to gather on your windshield, causing you to have to use your wipers. This is a clue that the potential exists for a

heavy fog condition to happen. A body of water, an agricultural field, or a low area in the roadway are all places where fog might gather.

To avoid foggy areas, turn on your CB radio to the channel the truckers are using. In most parts of the country, this is usually channel 19. When truckers spot fog banks, they warn each other, often referring to mile marker poles. Identifying trouble spots in advance will help you to be prepared. Pull off the road at an exit before you reach the fog and sit until it dissipates.

If you are forced to drive in foggy conditions, slow down and drive defensively. Take notice of what professional drivers around you are doing. Consider turning your four-way (emergency) flashers on. Used by professional drivers when climbing hills, the flashers signal that the vehicle is traveling slower than the rest of traffic. Do not use your flashers when parked alongside the roadway in fog – you may be mistaken for a slow-moving vehicle.

Black Ice

Another dangerous condition that most people don't recognize

is known as black ice. This condition occurs when ice melts and refreezes throughout the day. As the temperature lowers, the moisture that hasn't evaporated can refreeze into a very

thin coating on the roadway. Black ice can also occur on

bridge surfaces at any time since the cold air under the bridge may prevent melting. Mountainous or hilly terrain where the sun is prevented from hitting both sides of the roadway is an area where you may find black ice. It usually occurs on the south side of an east-west highway.

At night, if your headlights no longer illuminate the roadway in front of you, that's a sure sign of black ice. What's occurring is that the black ice on the roadway causes your headlights to reflect up off the road and into the air. Snow,

ice, and slush, though dangerous conditions, can usually be avoided by RV'rs. You don't have to travel when the weather gets bad. If you are moving to the south for the winter, you can stop and park or postpone your departure until the weather clears. If you are caught in snow, slush, or ice, use the same defensive driving techniques mentioned for use in other adverse driving conditions.

Take notice of the changes in the weather that will affect your travel, and don't take chances. Adjust your driving style and schedule to whatever the weather conditions require to ensure that you arrive safely at your destination.

DISCOVERY MODIFICATIONS: HEADLIGHT ON WARNING BUZZER by Pete Shaffer

urpose: My 1997 model didn't have any device to warn if I left the headlights on after I shut off the engine and removed the key. I didn't want a harsh sounding buzzer as a reminder, but I wanted a softer "ding" of a chime. This device only has three connections to the coach, 12-volt accessories, 12-volt lights, and ground; easy to build and install.



Parts & Cost: Radio Shack chime (catalog #273-071) \$10; standard 12-volt relay that I bought on eBay for \$1 (Radio Shack catalog #275-226, \$6); package of insulated female quick-disconnect terminals (catalog #64-3132), \$2; doublesided foam tape (catalog #64-2361), \$2; two each in-line fuse holder (catalog #270-1238), \$4; two fast-acting 0.5 amp fuses (catalog #270-1047), \$5.00; total \$24.00.

Time to build: This took me about one hour to build after I sketched the wiring diagram, and about one hour to install.

Construction Description: Mount both the relay and tone generator to a small scrap piece of thin board. Since this device will be hidden from view, looks aren't that important.

Looking at the bottom of the relay, there should be numbers identifying the terminals. These should be 30, 85, 86, 87, 87a. The Radio Shack chime has three wires – blue, black, and red.

Using insulated female quick-disconnect terminals, connect the blue and black tone wires and 12-inch length of black wire to relay connection #85. Using another female quick-disconnect

terminal, connect the remaining red wire to relay connection

Using a 2-foot length of blue 18 gauge wire and a quickdisconnect, connect one wire end to relay #87a.

Using a 2-foot length of red 18 gauge wire, connect one end to relay terminal #86.

Find a good location for mounting the relay/tone board under the dash, and run the red and blue wires through the firewall (use an existing hole, or drill a new one), to the front fuse box. Connect the red wire to one end of the in-line fuse holder and attach a male quick-disconnect to the other end. Plug the quick-disconnect of the fuse holder to the accessories output (only hot when key is turned on) in the fuse box.

Connect the blue wire to the second fuse holder and other end of fuse holder to quick-disconnect terminal. Plug this end into a lighting output (hot when lights are turned on) in the fuse box (the black ground wire can be connected to any good ground connection under the dash board).


Test the circuits by turning on the headlights. The tone generator should chime. When the ignition key is turned off, chime should stop. When the headlights are turned off, chime should remain quiet. When the key is turned off, chime should be quiet.

When it all checks out, mount the relay/tone board to your chosen location.

Clean up all tools and debris and call your supervisor for a final inspection and get a thumbs up!

Diagram Notes: The relay shown below is at rest (key not turned on). When key is turned on, 12 volts are activated on the accessories circuit and applied to terminal #86 on the relay. This activates relay, breaking contact at #87a and making contact at terminal #87. Since terminal #87 is not connected to anything, no chime will sound. If lights are turned on, 12 volts will be present at #87a, but since key is on, this connection is broken and no chime will sound. If key is turned off, no voltage will be present
